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President's Report Danny Schilds

First, I would like to assure the membership that our Association is in a very good financial situation largely because of the foresight of the Provincial Boards starting in 2009. The Board began to put some funds away every year in case of a 'rainy day' as well as being careful to never run a deficit budget. The last few years have been a rainy day in spades and in spite of a lack of registration funds and increased expenses, the BCSSA is on strong financial ground.

I would like to thank all the Board Members for their service to the BCSSA. As you will learn from their individual reports, they have all been busy working at planning events as well as taking care of the day to day business of the Association. We have a working board and the volunteers that make up this board do put in a lot of hours on the membership's behalf.

I first started with our organization in 1969 as a swimmer. I have many fond memories of swimming at Empire Pool and UBC as well as travelling around the Province to swim meets. Through the 80's and 90's I served for ten years on the board first as the Coaches Rep, then the Cariboo Regional Director and finishing as the Vice President. Around that time my own children started to swim so I became a swim Dad and Starter/Referee. (it seemed like every weekend) In 2008 I was elected back on the board, first as the Vice President and then as the President. Provincial Manager's Report Penny Bartel

It's been a fun season, finally getting to see BCSSA "in action" after 2 years of slow & cautious, mostly virtual, activities. I can see why volunteers like Danny Schilds have been involved for 50+ years... the heart and soul of this organization is rooted in compassion and caring and genuine affection for each other.

The Provincial Office has been making progress in a number of projects over the past year: improving our safe sport policy suite and risk management plans, updating the sport rules and changing the format of the rule book, updating and improving the results database project that was piloted in the 2021 season, and creating an updated and more modern website.

The production of the new **Rule book** was quite the undertaking in order to bring all the sport disciplines together into one publication with one style and one format. There is still room for improvement (sorry for the mistakes that were found) and our next challenge is to separate the sport rules from procedures!

I am particularly proud of the advances that BCSSA has made towards improving the safety and protection of our athletes and volunteers. Our **Safe Sport Policy Suite** will be presented to the fall Board of Directors meeting to be considered for adoption. Thank you to summer student **Tomas** for working in this area this summer!

Finally thank you to **Joanne** and **David** and **Elena**, our other summer staff, who have worked on improving our website, our results database, and our data administration respectively. I couldn't have done it without you... **Thank you!**



Vice-President Jim Baxter

It is so awesome to be running in person swim meets again this season, seeing the athletes preforming at a high level and having fun is great.

We did not have any major rule changes for swimming, diving, or artistic swimming this year. Changed up the age requirements and instituted beach polo, 4x4, for water polo trying to get a higher level of participation for water polo.

Many thanks to Danny for his leadership and knowledge that he has provided to the BCSSA.

I am looking forward to an amazing Provincial Meet in Kamloops and seeing all our friends from around the province.





Treasurer Jeff Sheehan

It was another challenging year for the Finance Committee, as we approached another summer season not knowing how successful we were going to be in having a full season with meets and a provincial championship. As of this writing it looks as though it has been as complete and full of a season as could have hoped for. This was my first season as treasurer and the with the addition of our bookkeeper last year, the responsibilities have become much more manageable for a volunteer position.

As for the fiscal year that ended on March 31 of this year, the good news is that we showed a profit of about **\$52,000**. This made up more than half of the loss we reported in the previous year due to the pandemic. I wasn't part of budgeting process for that year, but as you can see this was a very positive outcome as budgeting through these times is particularly challenging.

Some notable items from the financial statements include registration fees at about 85% of pre-pandemic levels. Because we didn't run the provincial championships, we missed out on about \$70,000 in revenues from the event while saving about \$65,000 in expenses. The bulk of savings for the year came from holding back on expenses for courses & seminars as well as development expenses like grants and strategic implementation.

The organization continues to be in excellent financial health. Our two term deposits had a total of **\$239,048.70** in them and our bank accounts had a total of **\$94,017.94** for total cash of **\$333,066.64** as of year-end.

This past year has been the year of innumerable hours and Google searches in order to take the carefully pulled data from each and every club and have it self-populate into usable information. This is all thanks to formulae that begin with "Countifs", "Countif", Sum, "VLookup", or "Query" followed by long lines of Google Spreadsheet ranges and pages. Somehow, when the spaces, Dollar signs, quotation marks, and brackets are all in their correct place a magical thing happens on the BCSSA spreadsheet.

I can tell you very quickly how many males, females, O Cats, S Cats, artistic, WP, Divers, and more you have in your club, region, and BCSSA as a whole. Lists of duplicate swimmers, along with lists of Coaches, Artistic Swimmers, Divers, and WP players self-populate into one list for each of our Directors. Athletes who participate in more than one sport are also easily sorted and the final number for billing information is the result of a simple formula that does not count athletes who pay and play with a second club.

Next year we will deal with trial swimmers in an easy fashion, with Google Sheets it's easy to identify them and not have them in the official registration list. Winter registrations are also easy. It's a matter of taking each club's new database, pasting it to the summer one, and removing the duplicates through Google formulae. I am able to tell at a glance how many additional athletes need their BCSSA fee paid.


Active has been responsive to our questions and has continued to develop their question and answer database. I highly recommend using the 'help' button on your active site, but feel free to ask as well:)

With this spreadsheet, Regional and Club registrars now can spend their time doing the important work of determining swimmer eligibility, supporting parents and clubs with eligibility issues, and not wasting countless hours hand-counting athletes, looking for duplicates, or other difficult issues.

It is my plan for 2023 to remove the SS/SW/WW swimmer question as it has become redundant with the fee change and with the formula-driven Google Spreadsheet I have made. I also hope to continue the work of designing an easy method of sorting transfers and assignments. A couple of changes to the "Required columns list" but nothing very painful. Stay tuned!

I thank each of the regional registrars who are working hard with their clubs to support registration and eligibility. They respond to my requests and errors with kindness and they work especially hard in ensuring that BCSSA is fair and nobody has an undue advantage. It is my goal to make their lives easier and so as always, any tips tricks or suggestions that would ease the registrar's work, please shout it out!

Director of Member Services Brendan Connelly

This is my first year in this position. I am so very impressed with the experience and knowledge of the members of this provincial board. While I have been the president of my local club for six years, this position has me feeling like a bit of a newb.



My predecessor in this position dealt with two seasons disrupted by the pandemic. It was still impacting our sport at the start of my term. Our meetings are still via Zoom. The Spring Conference was done virtually again. While still beneficial, it does not quite compare to face-to-face seminars. Over the winter, I did what I could to sort out the responsibilities of this role. This consisted of mostly sitting on a few sub-committees and answering queries from members as they came in.

As the summer started, it seems as we are nearly back to prepandemic normal. The multi-club competitions are back. It is a fabulous feeling seeing all the smiling faces and racing kids back at the pool. The biggest challenge for many clubs is losing two years' worth of more experienced parent volunteers, especially in officiating, as their kids aged out. On top of that, parents that joined over the last two years did not have opportunities to gain experience. From what I know of swim families, this is a temporary blip. After this year, a whole new generation of parents will be ready for 2023.

I look forward to helping with Hospitality Services (Member Services desk) at Provincials. I would like to thank the entire BCSSA Board of Directors for their tremendous support. I look forward to the year ahead, having now completed my first year in this position.



This year has been one of significant change! After 2 years of not holding in-person Provincial Championships, here we are! This year also saw the resignation of our former Director of Officials, Mike Craig. Please join me in thanking him for supporting Officials throughout the province through a very difficult time in the swimming community (COVID).

While I have only held this position for a few weeks, my discussions with the Regional Directors of Officials fill me with encouragement and hope. Clubs throughout the province (& Washington state) saw athletes age-out, resulting in a significant loss of officials (usually more senior and experienced ones). In some regions, those parents continued to attend and officiate meets, despite the absence of their children. In other regions, those more experienced officials played an integral role in the training of new officials. Clubs got creative in how they planned meets so as to optimize the use of available officials. Everyone around the province and state did what we do best – we rallied together and got the job done!

Looking towards the upcoming year, we need to continue our focus on training new officials, while retaining and promoting those we already have. Let's make use of the resources we have available to us in the more experienced officials, if they are available. I am looking forward to working with all of you in the coming year!

Director of Competition Sean Cauley



Here we go - back to a more 'normal' Provincial Championship Meet after a couple of 'not so normal' seasons.

We will be continuing with the simplified marshalling for the senior pool prelims at Provincials as debuted in 2018, and we have eliminated marshalling for finals for O Cat 2 and Div. 7 & 8, in order to give coaches more time to spend on deck with their athletes, and less time sitting on a bench. Feedback on this new procedure from 2019 was positive, and it makes things easier and simpler for athletes and officials alike.

We have also made changes to the procedures for Regional Alternates and for the inputting of swimmer names for relays, both of which will reduce errors, and will further reduce the workload for the beleaguered Clerk and Marshalls at Provincials!

At the time I write this, final arrangements are being made with the facility people in Kamloops, and I think that you will all be pleased with the changes to the facility spectator entrance. Even with the improved viewing area, **capacity** will still be limited, and we will be encouraging spectators to help each other out so that as many as possible can watch the races they came to see. We will be streaming all the speed swimming online, so why not kick back and watch some of the racing on your phone?

Director of Diving Drea Beye



In 2022 we had three clubs with diving programs, representing three regions, an increase of two clubs since 2016:

- Coquitlam Sharks (Simon Fraser Region) 25
- North Vancouver Cruisers (Vancouver & District) 55
- Abbotsford Whalers (Fraser Valley Region) 7

Overall, there has been great competition. We have had two meets so far with another just around the corner before we get into our regional competitions. This year Coquitlam and Abbotsford will combine their regional competitions with a few North Van divers included and North Van will also host one of their own as well.

Overall registration numbers are doing quite well for diving.

All three clubs have coaches returning from last year with a few new ones in the mix. Burnaby and Port Moody did not run dive programs this year due to not being able to secure coaches. We are continuing to work with BC Diving to have training seminars available to train more coaches and had a few attend one in 2021. Swimming coaches who are interested could take the two-day Intro to Dive Coaching Clinic offered by BC Diving. Dates for this not yet known and anyone interested please email

Again we are struggling to have enough judges for our competitions and are looking to BC diving for help. Emails have been sent to clubs for parents to do some shadow judging as we are working with Shannon Sullivan to hold training sessions. The response from parents is not what we have hoped for. Coaches could also attend these sessions to become better trained as we generally rely on coaches filling in some of the spots for judging.

We are a small sport and would like to reaffirm to parents that we cannot hold the meets without participation. Please consider helping out at future meets. Any volunteer participation is greatly appreciated. Table worker get a front row view of the divers... hint hint!

Dive meets require the use of a sound system to announce dives and results. A small portable sound system, to be shared by all the clubs, would be very helpful. The cost would hopefully be under \$150. This purchase will be requested at the Board meeting in October.

Some clubs continue to have difficulty getting pool time. Fraser Valley Diving (a winter club) ended up offering pool time and support to Abbotsford Whalers to enable them to host a club meet, which was greatly appreciated!

Diving requirements were reviewed in 2016, and modified to reduce the difficulty for new divers, and to split the groups between Summer Divers and Open Divers. This has increased overall participation at meets, however there are relatively few divers competing in the Open categories, leading to limited competition for these divers. We will continue to encourage coaches to move divers from the Summer category to the Open category when they are able. Additionally, rules were again modified in 2021 adding one additional degree of difficulty aspect for dives with twists or rotations to give more incentive for summer divers to increase their dive portfolios.

Director of Artistic Swimming Nicola Iten



Artistic Swimming still has 4 clubs participating; Haney was not able to get a program together this year, fingers crossed for next season.

We are in the process of holding a judges course with 4 participants. This will help with the problem of getting judges out in the summer. So far the feedback has been positive by the course instructors. They will be able to train, have them practice with shadowing a full meet, take the exam and thus be fully certified all before the end of summer. These judges will be invited to judge at Provincials and will also be invited to judge in winter meets. The problem of getting judges out seems to be more troublesome since covid; mid-week is also a problem with working volunteers.

A couple of winter clubs were approached with their summer location counterparts and although nothing happened this year, the outlook is good for starting to expand outside of the lower mainland.

This year we held the Hootenany with North Van Cruisers as the host. Two clubs were able to come out and receive feedback from judges. Next week a figures meet will occur at Sharks in the Park, hosted by Coquitlam Sharks. Three out of the four clubs will be attending. Crescent Beach has taken on hosting Multi-Regionals in Surrey.

A heads up that the next couple of years are bringing big changes on how artistic swimming is judged. FINA just published a draft and we are not sure what Canada will adopt and how it will affect us.

We are looking forward to a successful summer program.







Excerpts from the full "2022 Report on Coaching"



The 2022 Season of the BC Summer Swimming Swimming Association (BCSSA) marks the first complete summer season since 2019. This return saw a large number of coaches employed within the association to accommodate the many swimmers welcomed into and returning to the BCSSA. This season presented many unique challenges for clubs to find coaching staff coming out of the pandemic and its associated restrictions. However, the BCSSA was able to provide a virtual Spring Conference to equip our coaches with useful knowledge and techniques to improve their sport communities.

This year a substantial number of coaches have been registered with the BCSSA. An approximate total of 378 coaches are involved in our four sports: speed swimming (360), water polo (42), artistic swimming (11) and diving (4). Some coaches (37) are multidisciplinary which accounts for the discrepancy between the total number of coaches and those in each discipline. Also there were some issues on reporting completeness so the actual number of coaches in the provinces is expected to be greater than 380.

The distribution of the age of coaches in the province is predominantly centered around 15-23 years of age. However, there is a minority of coaches that are between 39-66 years of age.

This year our coaches conference was another virtual event given the uncertainty of pandemic restrictions at the time. We had in excess of 100 attendees from throughout the province. Presentations from featured guests including Dale Miller (Executive Director of the Lifesaving Society of BC and Yukon), Nicole Shallow, Rachelle Harron and BCSSA President Danny Schilds were popular. So far, so good. Early indication is that Fall and Winter Maintenance numbers will be strong. Things are rolling. We hope the momentum continues.





What a difference a year makes!



Last year we were still, by and large, living in a world of virtual everything. Most of us were just getting to the stage where we could get together in person for small meets, and it was definitely something that we realized defines our Summer swimming. Those friendships, not just between swimmers, but parents too, are a vital part of BCSSA, and what makes it so great!

Most clubs were able to run a fairly "normal" Fall and Winter maintenance, but the Regional Board still kept meeting virtually. In fact, as great as it is to get together in person, the ease and convenience of virtual meetings, I think, means that they are going to be here to stay throughout the "off season". As restrictions started to ease, we began planning for a regular summer season. All clubs who normally run meets were able to do so again, in spite of some challenges. The loss of two summer seasons meant that all clubs faced the challenge, like so many others across the Province, of lack of experienced volunteers. This meant lots of new faces in critical jobs at meets, and on deck as officials. Our Region did an amazing job of coming together to support one another, volunteering countless hours at each others' meets, just to make sure that the swimmers got to have the best chance possible to do what they love – swim, race and connect with their friends.

Attendance was slightly down at many of our meets – the high cost of gas and accommodation meant that many families found themselves having to pick and choose which meets to attend. The Oak Bay Orcas and Saanich Peninsula Piranhas faced an additional challenge that came with hosting their meets at Saanich Commonwealth Place – the facility imposed a 300 swimmer cap on both meets (including Novice swimmers), and only one coach per team was allowed on the deck at a time, making it difficult for swimmers to connect with their coaches in the stands, and also making it difficult for the DDO to connect with the coaches! The Piranhas actually hosted a special Novice meet at Panorama Leisure Center in Sidney, in order to allow as many swimmers as possible to participate. We were very excited to welcome a record 8 teams from other regions at the Nanaimo White Rapids meet – it was fun to have other swimmers to compete against, and the extra help on deck from out-of-region officials was very greatly appreciated. And a couple of Penticton swimmers were able to attend the Saltspring Stingrays meet, our last club meet prior to Regionals. There have been some pretty awesome Parent relays at a couple of meets as well – perhaps next year we will see some Parent Artistic Swimming??



This was the first summer the new rules that went into effect on August 31st, 2021 separating the high-performance players that will now be referred to as O-Cat and the summer players. This rule was put in in hopes of creating an opportunity for the growth of developing players and the continuation of O-Cat players, as well as room for clubs to encourage players to join and try water polo. Another change that came to water polo was not a rule change but was implemented to continue the growth of water polo in BCSSA was beach water polo rules. This means smaller playing fields, nets and fewer players in the water. This is in hopes that with having to field fewer players on a team we will be able to keep kids in the sport longer and clubs with fewer players will still be able to participate in games and tournaments. We will also continue to work on the skill sets that are required in 6-on-6 water polo. 6-on-6 water polo is still encouraged for when clubs have the numbers.



Crescent Beach and Coquitlam Sharks were able to host tournaments this summer. North Delta Sunfish continued to grow their sport through outreach to other clubs within their region. Many clubs were able to host scrimmages within their region as well as outside their region. Additionally, we saw the growth of water polo in the Fraser South with Cloverdale Tritons and WRASA adding water polo to their summer clubs.
